## Introduction

The 2008 Leading Indicators Report from United Way of Lane County provides a stability and wellness scan of Lane County, Oregon. Thirty-seven different indicators have been compiled into one document to be used as a tool by nonprofit and governmental agencies, grant writers, policy makers, philanthropists and caring citizens.

The purpose of this document is to provide a single resource for individuals and organizations seeking to better respond to the issues that affect quality of life for Lane County residents.

The complexity of human and social issues facing Lane County cannot be addressed by any single entity. By inviting Lane County's key organizations, community leaders, charities and governments to focus on the same issues using the same data means that we can more effectively effect change where it's needed by leveraging one another's strengths.

Trend lines represented in the 2008 Leading Indicators Report cover 10 years or more.

Trends that move dramatically up or down are affected by a multitude of environmental issues, many of which are out of our control such as national and regional economic shifts. It is too early to measure the consequences of the most recent shock waves to America's economy. However, significant impact on improving life for people can be and has been made by focusing as a community on the issues that we deem vital to quality of life such as education, income and healthcare access.

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## EDUCATION

### KEY TRENDS:

- Rate of infants born at low birth weight (5lbs, 8oz) has increased 10-percentage points over a ten-year trend
- Child abuse and neglect rates have slightly decreased over the last five years
- Percent of students eligible for free and reduced lunch has increased over a nine-year trend and keeps close pace with state trends
- Reading proficiency is relatively strong at 3rd grade with improvement made over the last ten years; however, reading proficiency at 8th grade drops significantly and shows only slight gains as recently as last year
- Percent of 12th grade high school completers has decreased steadily over the last five years

The amount of research now available regarding early child development is unprecedented. We know the first five years of a child's life are critical to lifelong development. Early childhood experiences affect brain development, which impacts a child's cognitive, social and emotional well-being the foundation for early-learning success and later life success. Factors that influence early development associate with infant and maternal health, poverty, and family stability.

According to United Way of America, children from low-income families are more likely to start school with limited language skills, health problems, and social and emotional problems that interfere with learning. The percent of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunches is often used as a measure of children's economic well-being. Higher percentages mean more children live in low-income families (children from families with incomes at or below 130% of the poverty level are eligible for free meals; between 130-185% are eligible for reduced-price meals).

According to the US Census, from 2000 to 2006 families with children under 18 years of age accounted for 25-30% of total households in Lane County. Roughly one third of family households with children under 18 were headed by non-married individuals. Of those, over 70% were headed by females (N= over 9,000 family households average per year across the seven-year trend). In the last three years, of the female-headed family households with children under 18, over 60% lived below the poverty level (N= over 5,000 households per year). UWLC is currently researching appropriate methods to track development factors at particular age intervals to determine readiness for school.

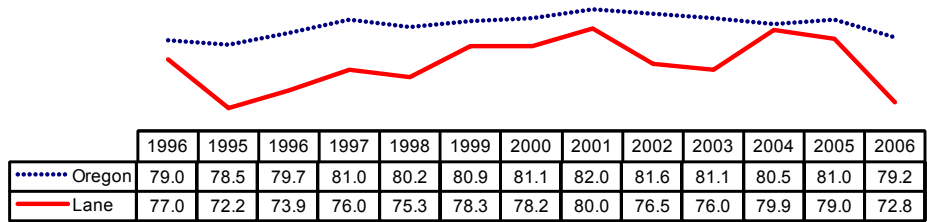
### Percent of Mothers Getting Early Prenatal Care During First Trimester

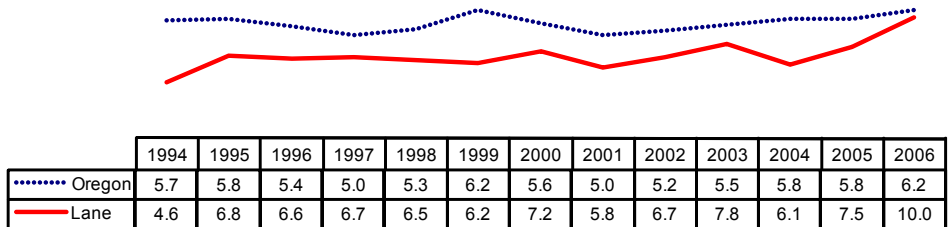
### Percent of Mothers Getting Inadequate Prenatal Care

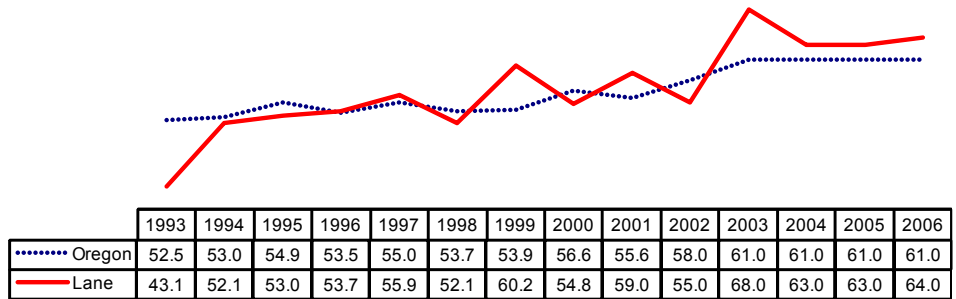
### Low Birth Weight (5 lbs, 8oz) Newborns Rate per 1,000 Births

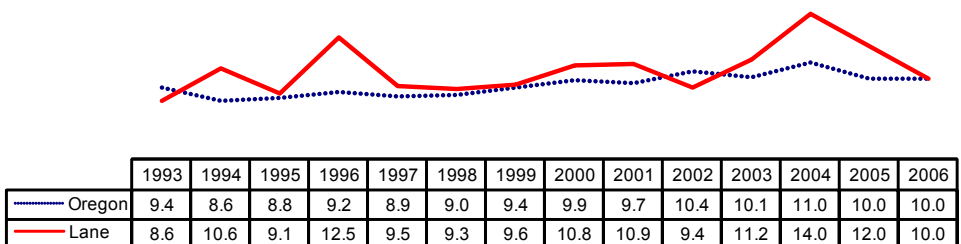
### Very Low Birth Weight (3 lbs, 4oz) Newborns Rate per 1,000 Births

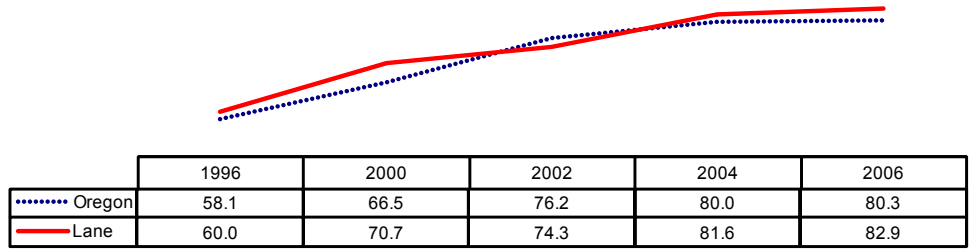
### Percentage of Kindergartners Entering School Ready to Learn

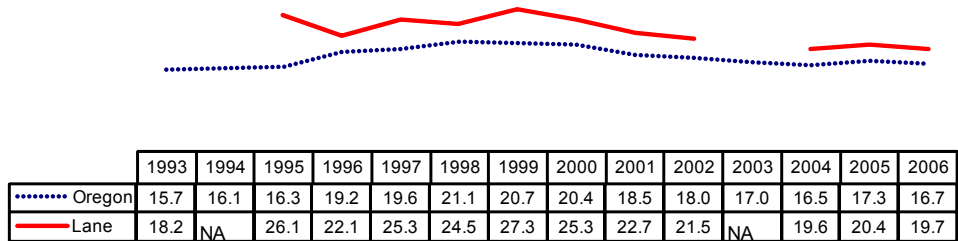
### Childcare Slots Available Rate per 100 Children (Ages 0-13)

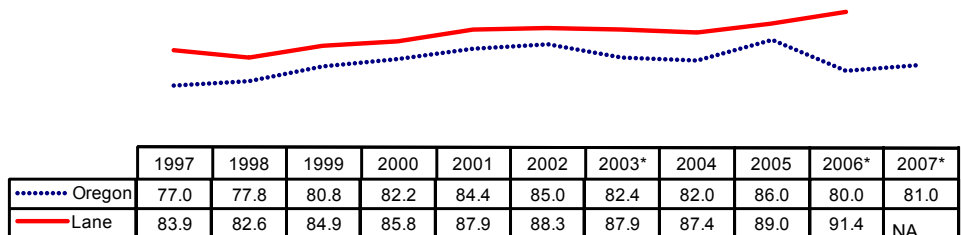
### Percentage of 3rd Grade Students Who Achieve Established Skills in Reading

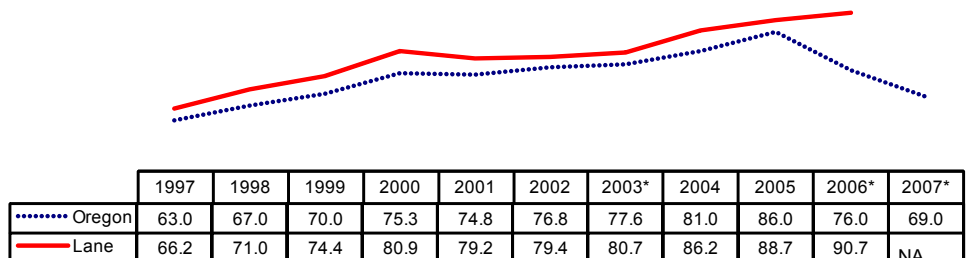
### Percentage of 3rd Grade Students Who Achieve Established Skills in Math

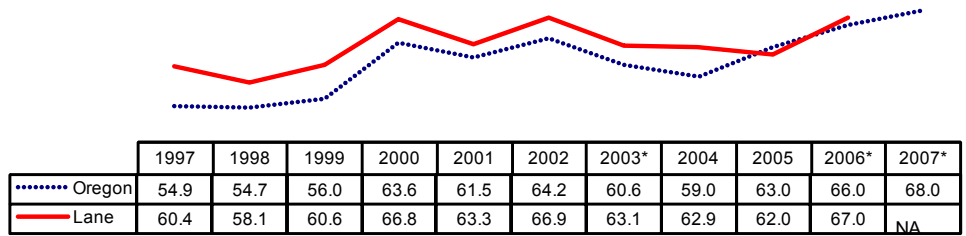
**Percentage of 8th Grade Students Who Achieve Established Skills in Reading**

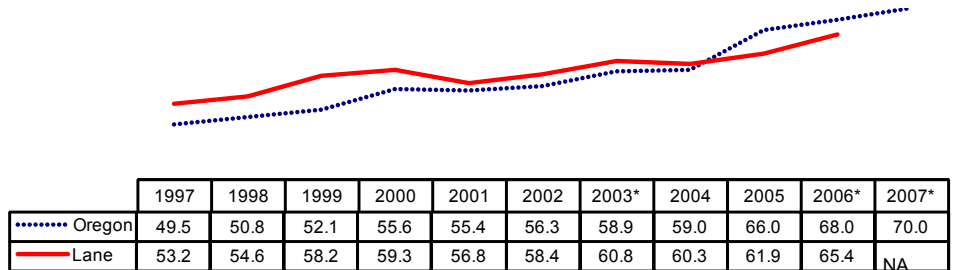
**Percentage of 8th Grade Students Who Achieve Established Skills in Math**

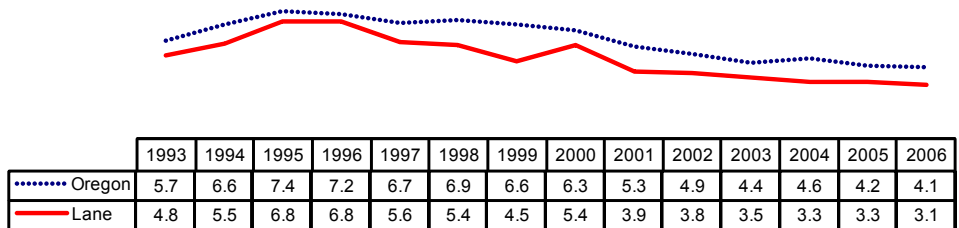
**Percentage of High School Student Who Drop Out**

**Percentage of High School Students Who Drop Out (Grades 9-12)**



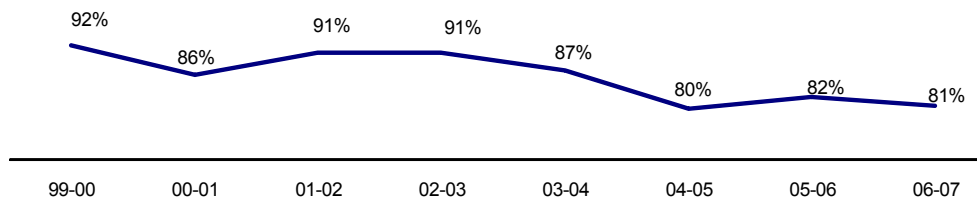

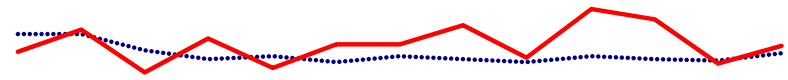
### Infant Mortality Rate per 1,000 Births

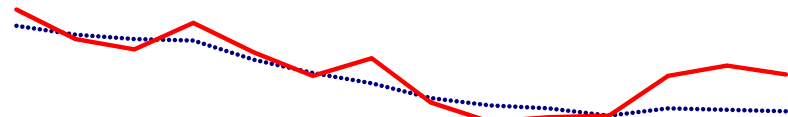
### Percent of Infants Whose Mothers Used Tobacco During Pregnancy (Self-reported by mother)

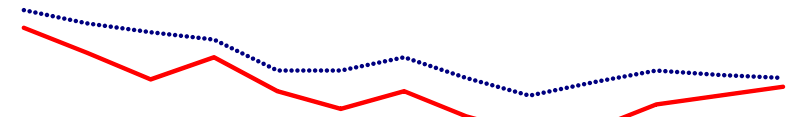
### Percent of Infants Whose Mothers Used Alcohol During Pregnancy (Self-reported by mother)

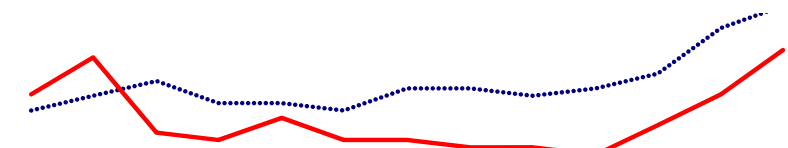
### Percentage of Live Births with Maternal Illicit Drug Use

Percentage of Live Births with Maternal Illicit Drug Use



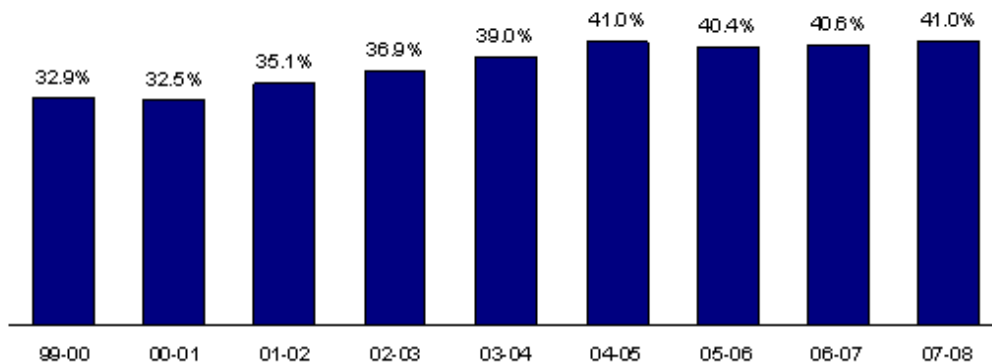

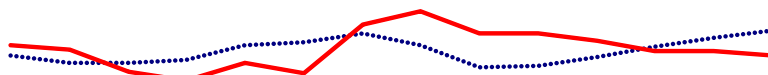
### Child Abuse and Neglect Rate per 1,000 Children (Ages 0-17)

## HEALTH

### KEY TRENDS:

- Emergency Department (ED) utilization and charges by uninsured in Lane County has steadily increased over a three-year trend
- Oregon Health Plan (OHP) enrollment by Lane County residents fluctuates between 26K-28K over a three-year trend increasing to its highest point in 2008
- 76.1% of the 34,000 eligible Lane County residents were enrolled in the Oregon Health Plan\*

The results of the United Way of Lane County's (UWLC) 2004 Community Assessment revealed that access to doctors, affordable medications and health insurance were the top three needs across all socioeconomic, age and geographic groups of respondents.

The survey also showed that among households with some type of insurance over the prior 12 months, the Oregon Health Plan (Medicaid) was the least stable source of coverage, with 52% being uninsured at some time over the prior two years. Increasing numbers of individuals neither fit the eligibility criteria for government insurance programs, nor receive healthcare coverage from their employers.

According to Lane Workforce Partnership's State of the Workforce Report, 2007-2008, Lane County's employment base is characterized by many lower wage jobs; occupations with the highest number of jobs also being the lowest paying. As a result, there are many working poor in Lane County who do not qualify for the Oregon Health Plan (OHP), or who move on and off insured status. The 2006 Oregon Population Survey, analyzed by the Office for Oregon Health Policy and Research, found that approximately 17.1% of residents in Region 3, which includes Lane County, report being uninsured, compared with 15.4% of residents across Oregon. This estimate translates into one in five Lane County residents, or more than 57,000 uninsured (based on population of 337,870).

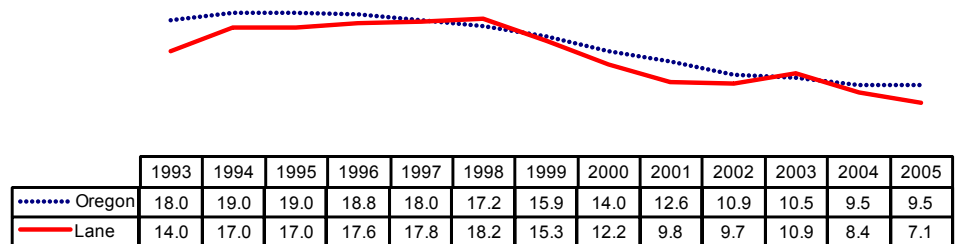
### Teenage Pregnancy Rate per 1,000 Females (Ages 10-17)

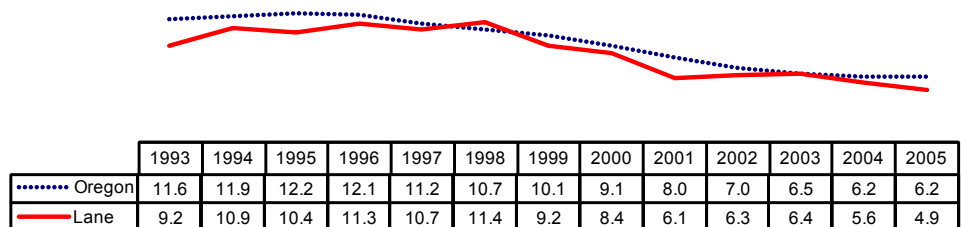
### Percentage of Births to Mothers Ages 10-17

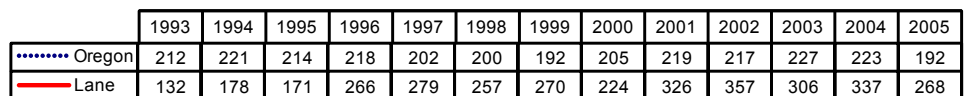
### Teenage Suicide Attempt Rate per 100,000 Youths (Ages 10-17)

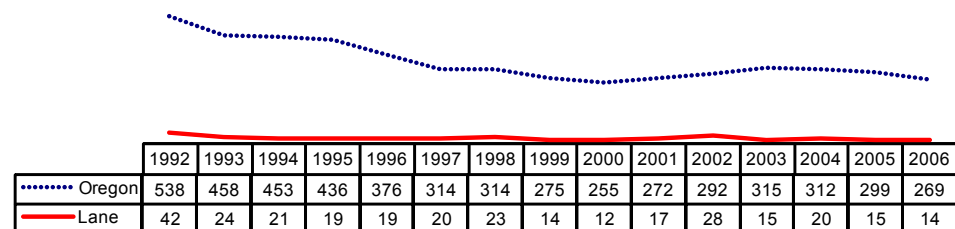
### Number of Cases of HIV Infection Among Adolescents and Adults (13 and older)

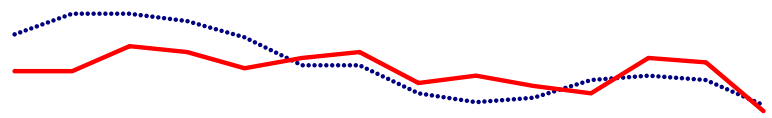
**Premature Death: Years of Life Lost Before Age 70 (Per 1,000 Oregonians)**

Premature Death: Years of Life Lost Before Age 70 (Per 1,000 Oregonians)



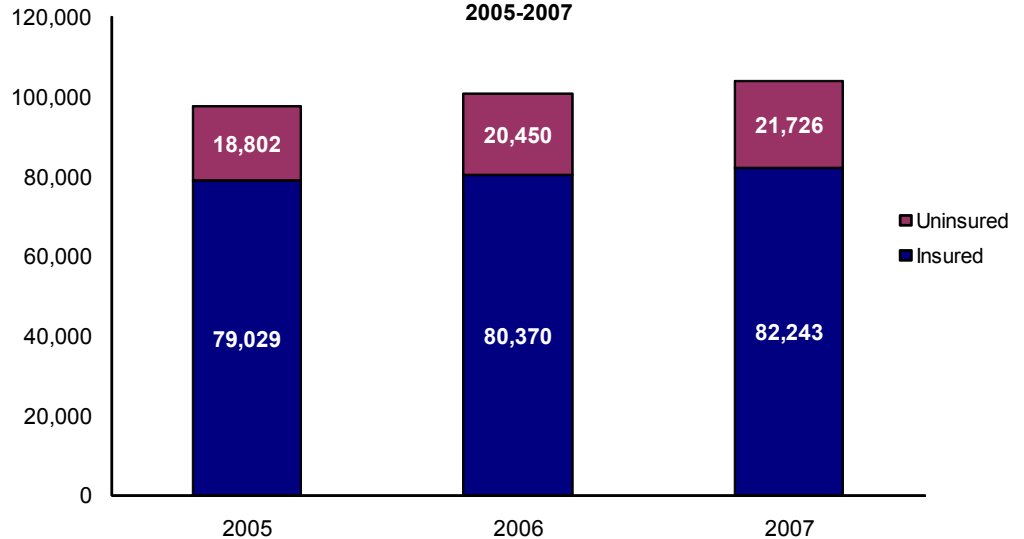

Emergency Department Utilization in Lane County 2005-2007

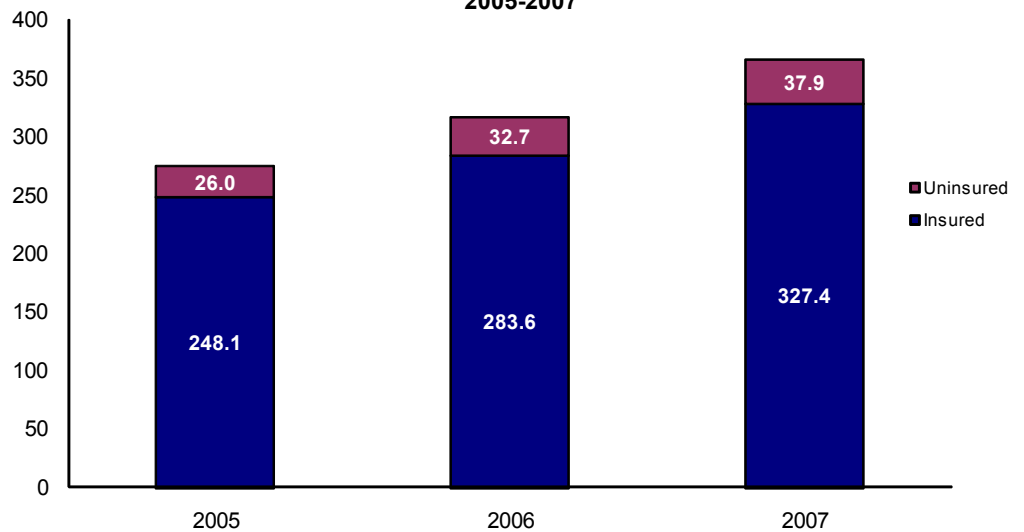

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## INCOME

### KEY TRENDS:

- Wages from employment have increased slightly over a ten-year period, but remain consistently below state trends
- Percent of residents living below poverty has remained flat over seven year trend
- Hourly wage required to afford Fair Market Rent has outpaced actual wages earned for the average renter over the last four years

Average annual payroll tracks how each worker is faring with regard to income from employment. According to a Bureau of Labor Statistics news report from October 2007, the average weekly wage of \$672 in the fourth quarter of 2006, placed Lane County in the bottom third of a nationwide ranking and among Oregon's 6 largest counties, Lane County's slight gain that year was the slowest.

Results from United Way of Lane County's (UWLC) 2007 Community Assessment revealed that increasingly higher income levels are needed in order to meet basic household needs in Lane County. Despite economic improvements between 2005 and 2007, many households in Lane County are financially insecure. Financial hardships are more severe among low-income family households with children. Households earning \$34K or less have difficulty paying for basic necessities such as housing, food, utilities, and transportation. Households that include a person with a chronic medical condition are more than twice as likely to be earning incomes at or below \$34K.

The largest single expense for the majority of Lane County households is housing. The National Low-Income Housing Coalition (NLIHC) considers housing "severely unaffordable" when residents are spending over 50% of household income on housing. In 2008, NLIHC reported that Lane County renters require 55% of their income to afford a two-bedroom fair-market rent. One unanticipated emergency can lead many Lane County families to financial crisis. Achieving greater stability allows lower-income working families to move toward financial independence.

### Average Annual Payroll (Pay Per Worker)

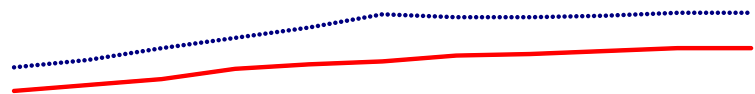

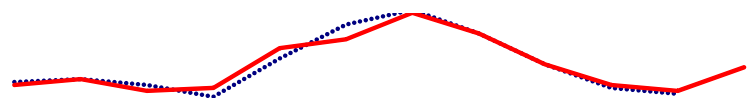
### Unemployment Rate

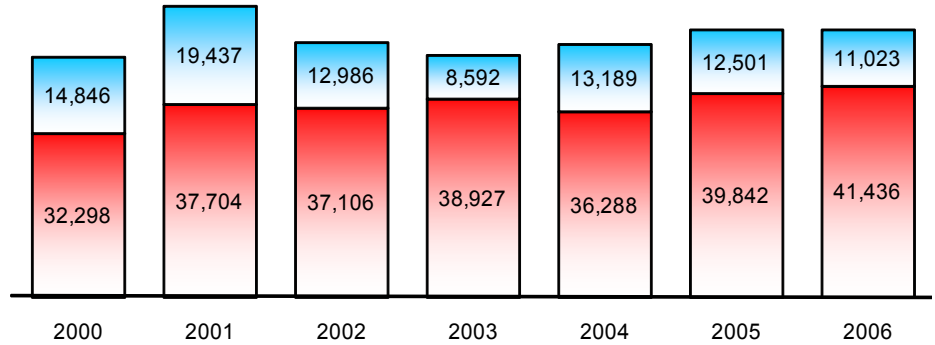

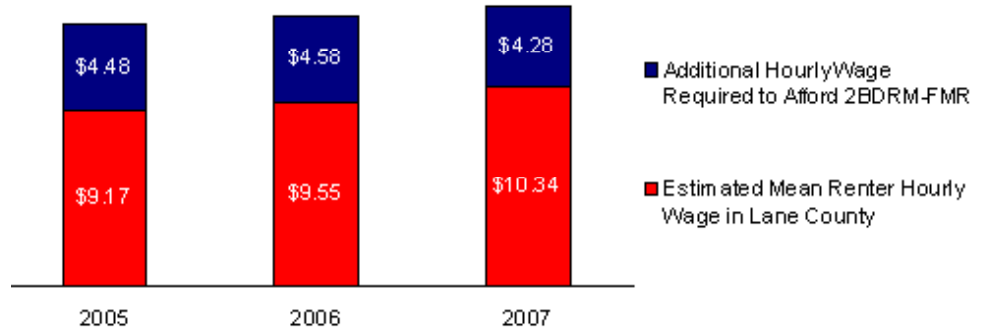

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## COMMUNITY

### KEY TRENDS:

- Lane County is slightly higher than the state in registered voter turnout for primary elections and experienced a downward trend since 2000
- Lane County is experiencing a slight, but steady increase in the proportion of seniors maintaining independent living and matches the state almost exactly across the fifteen-year trend
- Crimes against persons in Lane County have decreased to a slightly lower level than the state while property crimes are higher than statewide trends

Voter turnout is recognized as the most appropriate measurement of public participation and is inherently a measurement of the democratic strength and unity of a community. Studies indicate that people who see voting as an important civic responsibility also invest time and effort to improve the overall quality of life in their community.

Another measure of community vitality is the degree to which senior citizens maintain health, remain active, and sustain their independent living status. The proportion of seniors in need of assistance with daily activities indicates general quality of life for an important segment of our community.

Residents want to feel safe within their neighborhoods and contribute to an overall sense of security within their community. Criminal activity weakens that sense of security, inhibits prosperity, and devalues our personal and community quality of life. Juvenile crime is especially disturbing because the future of a community lies in the ability of its youth to develop into emotionally stable and productive adults.

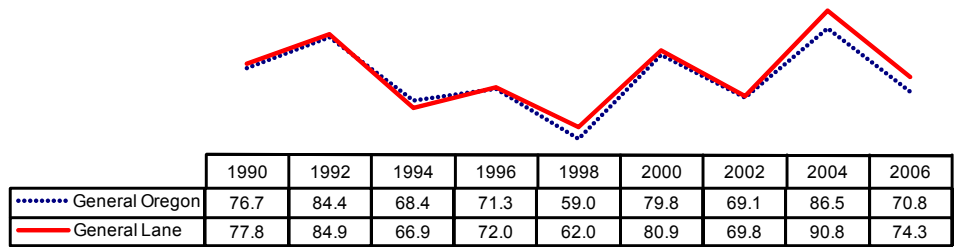
### Percentage of Registered Voters who Voted in General Elections

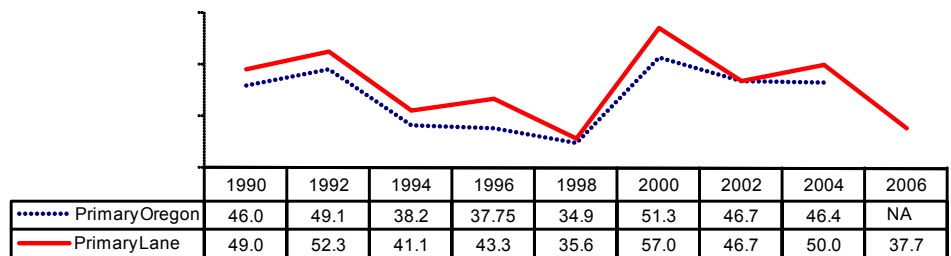
### Percentage of Registered Voters who Voted in Primary Elections

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Percentage of Registered Voters Who Voted in Primary Elections



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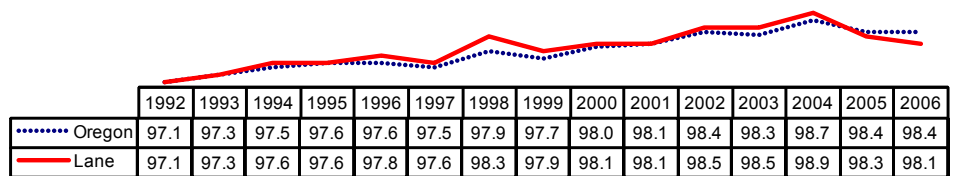

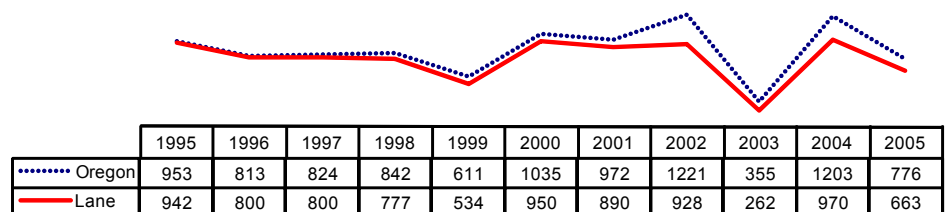
### Documented Incidents of Criminal Domestic Disturbances in Lane County

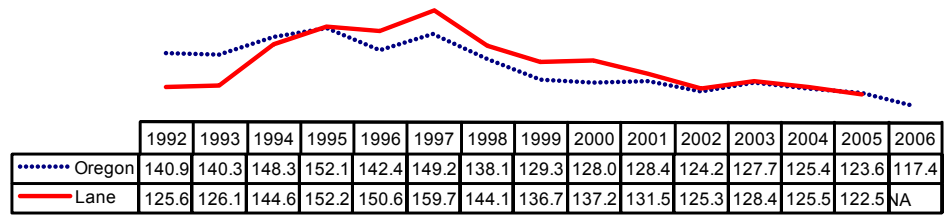
### Overall Crime Rate per 1,000 Persons

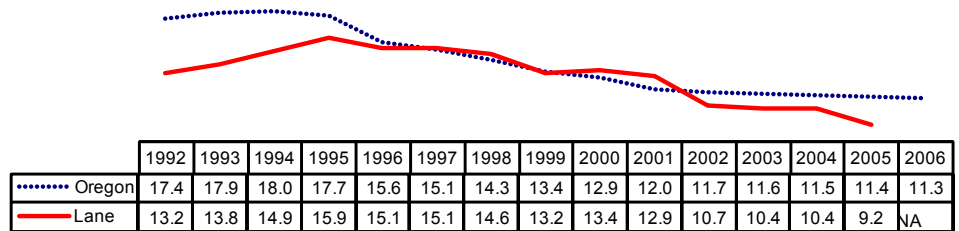
### Crimes Against Persons Rate per 1,000 Persons

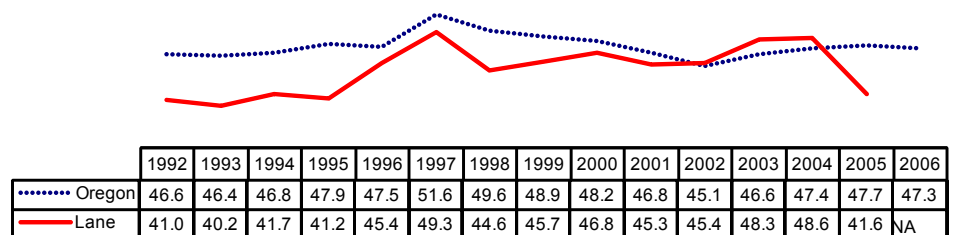
### Behavior Crime Rate per 1,000 Persons

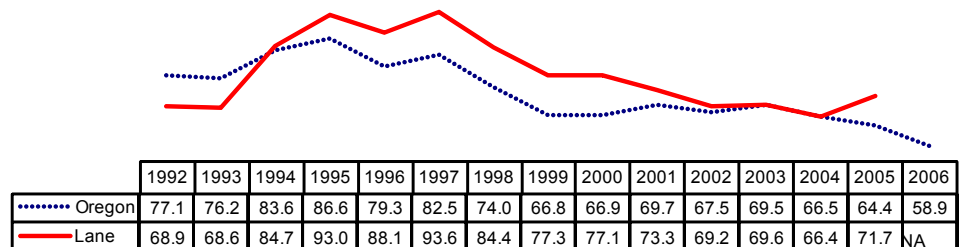
### Property Crime Rate per 1,000 Persons

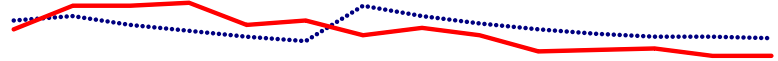

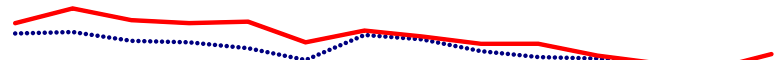
### Juvenile Property Crimes Referral Rate per 1,000 Youth
